On September 28-29th, Hurricane Helene, the third-deadliest hurricane in modern times, caused devastating loss of life, flooding, and destruction throughout the Southeastern United States. Hit hardest was North Carolina, and western cities such as Asheville, where emergency supplies had to be brought in by mule and air due to roads being completely washed away.

The work to recover and rebuild will be extensive, and our concern for their community includes Serving USA's partner Changed Choices, based out of Charlotte, NC. Their major fundraiser 25th Anniversary Gala celebration, slated for the evening of September 28, was postponed at the last minute as dangers of the storm became most apparent. Changed Choices' funding needs are present and immediate today. In Mecklenburg County their outreach to currently incarcerated and reentering women, 80% of whom are mothers, is critical for these women to remain successful in their healing. Reverand Nate DeWard began working with Reach the Forgotten in 2014 after 16 years of working in ministry and non-profit settings. His professional life has included chaplaincy, recruiting, fundraising, church planting, and pastoring churches. As Executive Director, he focuses on strengthening existing missions, leadership training, donor development, and expanding into new Michigan county jails.

Reach the Forgotten Jail Ministry (RTF), headquartered in Grand Rapids, Michigan, is a faith-based nonprofit focused on providing spiritual support and guidance to inmates in county jails across Michigan. Founded in 1966, the organization employs chaplains and over 2,000 volunteers to deliver services like Bible studies, worship services, Christian mentoring, addiction recovery classes, and Bible-based trauma healing. They emphasize redemption and restoration through faith in Jesus Christ, with the goal of helping inmates reintegrate into society as productive citizens upon release.

RTF operates in county jails throughout the state, offering programs such as Healing the Wounded Heart, a trauma healing initiative, and Bible mentorship in partnership with Crossroads Prison Ministries. They also facilitate Authentic Remote Ministry, allowing volunteers to connect with inmates via email, providing mentorship and encouragement

(Q) As the largest jail-specific ministry in Michigan, Reach the Forgotten serves in over 30 jails in 30 different counties. Providing shorter-term stays for inmates ahead of their sentencing or for lesser offenses than prisons, Michigan's jails are operated by local sheriff's department correctional staff and vary in size and budget pending their county's location. Understandably politics can intermingle with your ministry's mission. What techniques do you use to manage relationships with such a wide variety of correctional leaders, who may also be influential in accepting and/or implementing your programs in their respective jails?

(A) We related to sheriffs and their correctional staff on three levels: local, regional, and statewide. At the local level our chaplains are the face of the ministry and the leader of our jail program in a specific jail. They work as guests of the sheriff in the jail to ensure that there is an organized program of volunteers who come in the jail to serve. Chaplains are responsible at the local level for recruiting, training, and managing volunteers in their jail. Chaplains report to the regional leader of Reach the Forgotten for the purposes of our ministry.

We can encourage, equip, and hold our chaplains accountable as staff members who are part of our organization. This is important to make sure that our mission, vision, and values are represented consistently in the counties where we serve.

The regional leaders build relationships with the jail administrators and the sheriffs in their respective regions. That way, when turnover occurs, we can work collaboratively with the jail to provide a new chaplain and keep our services going with minimal interruption. Our regional leaders work with our home office ministry leadership team to provide statewide governance, resources, and ministry support. Each year, we send representatives to the Michigan Sheriffs' Association conferences where we are warmly welcomed and invited to interact with sheriffs, undersheriffs, and jail administrators from all over the state of Michigan. The key to managing relationships with each county is the regional leadership team who advocate for our ministry and make sure things are running smoothly at all levels of our operations in jails.

(Q) Michigan Department of Corrections realizes the impact of trauma on both staff and offenders, and their strategic plan includes becoming a trauma-informed department by August 2026. Many groups in our community are looking into additional mental health healing and Reach the Forgotten is a steadfast leader in providing trauma healing programs and trainings to other ministry groups, in partnership with American Bible Society/Trauma Healing Institute. Please share how the process works and key reasons you might recommend the 'Healing the Wounded Heart' program to Serving USA's partners working with Prisoners, Veterans or Women in Recovery.

(A) Reach the Forgotten began training leaders in the correctional version of Healing the Wounded Heart in 2019. We understood that we needed to make a multi-year commitment to training chaplains and volunteers who could learn a biblical model of trauma-informed care. Since we are training lay people, Healing the Wounded Heart was the perfect curriculum because it changed how we view and therefore treat inmates.

We now take into consideration the heart wounds (trauma) that can lead people to self-medicate through drugs and alcohol and commit crimes.

Our ministry helps inmates identify the source of their pain and using the biblical language of lament, take their pain to the cross and be restored by the power of God.

Our staff would love to help any interested organizations learn more because we have a team of "Master Facilitators" that now train people all over the world in this curriculum. It has been the most impactful program that we have been able to offer statewide in the last 5 years.

(Q) Ahead of the trends you have long promoted the importance of chaplaincy. Today chaplaincy awareness and their extensive value in society is skyrocketing. Your ministry model relies on chaplains as representatives and leaders connecting with inmates inside jail, as well as overseeing the thousands of RTF volunteers who provide support and execution of your programs throughout the state. What characteristics do you look for when interviewing to add a chaplain to your team? What advice and observations can you share for someone seriously considering studying to become a chaplain?

(A) Our chaplains believe that "No one is beyond God's reach." RTF chaplains understand that they may be meeting a person in jail at the absolute lowest point of their lives so they serve with a non-judgmental and compassionate presence. When we interview candidates for lead chaplain positions, we make sure they know Christ and have a good understanding of God's Word. We screen our chaplains to make sure they have experienced grace on a personal level.

Many of our chaplains are former inmates themselves who have been given a second chance and want to preach and teach about God's forgiveness and love to incarcerated people.

If a person is seriously looking into becoming a correctional chaplain, I would advise they volunteer at a local jail or prison near them to see if they are drawn to this kind of work. The Correctional Ministries and Chaplains Association is a great place to get training as well (<u>www.cmcainternational.org</u>).
